This has been our slogan for thirty-two years and one that will guide us as we plan for the next thirty-two years. Now is a critical moment in our history as we seek a permanent home for the two halves of our nonprofit; the District Exchange and the Food Pantry. We serve individuals and families in Oxford County who are food and clothing insecure. Our opportunity to purchase the 281 Walkers Mills Road in Bethel is now and it is a building as big as our vision for Western Maine's future.

I've been involved with this organization for twenty years and over that time have seen the impact of our work within the community we serve. While our region is large, our community is tight knit, allowing us to be aware of events that impact individuals or families and in turn, respond to that need. Whether it be the Pandemic, a forty-year flood or a chimney fire, we Western Mainers put aside our differences and help each other. And to think that two decades ago we gave clients a few cans of beans or a small bag of clothes. Our organization has grown with our community.

Now, we are a 501 c3 nonprofit with programs that serve all of our constituencies. Our choice market allows client/neighbors to choose the items needed each week. Our Snack and Backpack programs are available in all the local schools. Our Farm to Pantry program serves country pantries and supplements local farms.

The purchase of 281 Walkers Mills Road will enable us to increase our Food Pantry capacity and create a suitable space for the District Exchange, which has been unable to operate for the past three years. We know this building well. With modest renovations, we will be able to transform it into a highly functional space that will allow us to better serve all of our clients now and long into the future.

Our mission is to provide food and clothing to anyone who needs help. We do this through a wide range of programs that reach individuals, families, children and seniors throughout Oxford County, which is comprised of 34 towns and 4 unorganized territories, but no cities. We are committed to responding to and providing help to families as the need arises.

Join us as we prepare for a future that defies prediction. Here in Western Maine, a place we all love, support, and protect, we can get this done knowing that our community will be stronger for it. Work with us. Share Maine's future.

THE CHALLENGE



Our goal is to purchase the 281 Walkers Mills Road as our permanent home, while completely upgrading the capacity of our Food Pantry, and reopening the District Exchange alongside it.

OUR NEW HOME

281 Walkers Mills Road will provide over 3,000 square feet for our Food Pantry and almost 1,000 square feet for our District Exchange. The food pantry space will be three times the current size with a walk-in cooler and a walk-in freezer providing twelve times the cooling and freezing capacity currently available.
